Collect:

God of truth, help us to keep your law of love and to walk in ways of wisdom, that we may find true life in Jesus Christ your Son. **Amen.**

Psalm 116.1,12-19

1 I love the Lord, for he heard my voice; he heard my cry for mercy.
12 What shall I return to the Lord for all his goodness to me?
13 I will lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the Lord.
14 I will fulfil my vows to the Lord in the presence of all his people.
15 Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his faithful servants.
16 Truly I am your servant, Lord; I serve you just



as my mother did; you have freed me from my chains.

17 I will sacrifice a thank offering to you and call on the name of the Lord.

18 I will fulfil my vows to the Lord in the presence of all his people,

19 in the courts of the house of the Lord— in your midst, Jerusalem. Praise the Lord.

A reading from the book of Genesis (18.1-15; 21.1-7):

The Lord appeared to Abraham near the great trees of Mamre while he was sitting at the entrance to his tent in the heat of the day. Abraham looked up and saw three men standing nearby. When he saw them, he hurried from the entrance of his tent to meet them and bowed low to the ground. He said, "If I have found favour in your eyes, my lord, do not pass your servant by. Let a little water be brought, and then you may all wash your feet and rest under this tree. Let me get you something to eat, so you can be refreshed and then go on your way—now that you have come to your servant." "Very well," they answered, "do as you say."

So Abraham hurried into the tent to Sarah. "Quick," he said, "get three seahs of the finest flour and knead it and bake some bread." Then he ran to the herd and selected a choice, tender calf and gave it to a servant, who hurried to prepare it. He then brought some curds and milk and the calf that had been prepared, and set these before them. While they ate, he stood near them under a tree. "Where is your wife Sarah?" they asked him. "There, in the tent," he said. Then one of them said, "I will surely return to you about this time next year, and Sarah your wife will have a son." Now Sarah was listening at the entrance to the tent, which was behind him. Abraham and Sarah were already very old, and Sarah was past the age of childbearing. So Sarah laughed to herself as she thought, "After I am worn out and my lord is old, will I now have this pleasure?" Then the Lord said to Abraham, "Why did Sarah laugh and say, 'Will I really have a child, now that I am old?' Is anything too hard for the Lord? I will return to you at the appointed time next year, and Sarah will have a son." Sarah was afraid, so she lied and said, "I did not laugh." But he said, "Yes, you did laugh."

Now the Lord was gracious to Sarah as he had said, and the Lord did for Sarah what he had promised. Sarah became pregnant and bore a son to Abraham in his old age, at the very time God had promised him. Abraham gave the name Isaac to the son Sarah bore him. When his son Isaac was eight days old, Abraham circumcised him, as God commanded him. Abraham was a hundred years old when his son Isaac was born to him. Sarah said, "God has brought me laughter, and everyone who hears about this will laugh with me." And she added, "Who would have said to Abraham that Sarah would nurse children? Yet I have borne him a son in his old age."

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew (9.35-10.8)

Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." Jesus called his twelve disciples to him and gave them authority to drive out impure spirits and to heal every disease and sickness. These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon (who is called Peter) and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him.

These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: "Do not go among the Gentiles or enter any town of the Samaritans. Go rather to the lost sheep of Israel. As you go, proclaim this message: 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy, drive out demons. Freely you have received; freely give.

This is the gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, o Christ.

Reflection: I wonder if you have a good imagination? Imagination is a wonderful gift that allows us to change the society we live in, because we can imagine treating people better, and then find practical ways of making it happen. Imagination allows us to develop the person that we are, because we can envision what it might be like to behave in ways that we admire in others. We can imagine futures for our children, and we might daydream about the future for ourselves. Imagination also comes into play when we pray for our neighbourhood, when we speak out for justice, and when we realise that the world is not how it could be. But, often, our imaginations can also be very limited. I wonder how the disciples felt when Jesus sent them out to heal and to proclaim the good news. Did they feel scared, empowered, bold, nervous? Did they imagine that they were beginning to bring in the Kingdom of God? And in our reading from Genesis, when Sarah hears that she will have a son, despite already being old, her reaction is to laugh it off. She cannot imagine something that seems impossible.

Perhaps this reaction is familiar to us. It's so easy for us to imagine a limit to what God can do. We think we know what is possible, what is realistic, and sometimes we never look outside of this box. But God is so much bigger than that. Even our wildest imaginings cannot contain all that God could and does do. Because God specialises in dealing with the impossible. It happens again and again in the Bible - Sarah has a baby; the disciples are able to do miracles; Jesus walks on water, calms storms, feeds crowds with nothing, dies and comes back to life.

God constantly challenges our assumptions of what is possible. We are often anxious when we can't predict what the future might look like, and perhaps a reason we are often so scared of change is that we aren't sure if the change will be better or worse. We think that we'd rather stick with how things are, than risk life becoming harder in some way. But to imagine a changed world is what Jesus invites us to do. And as Christians, we are asked to take part in re-imagining the world into a better place. God's vision for us is one of fullness, of completeness of life and joy. A vision of love beyond anything we have known before. So as we wonder what life will look like in the next few months and years, take a moment to think about what you would long for. What is the best-case scenario you can possibly think of, and what could you do to help it become reality? It may well be that your imagining looks a lot like the Kingdom of God. - Rev Cat
