Almighty and eternal God, who, for the firmer foundation of our faith, allowed your holy apostle Thomas to doubt the resurrection of your Son till word and sight convinced him: grant to us, who have not seen, that we also may believe and so confess Christ as our Lord and our God.

Psalm 31.1-6

- 1 In you, O Lord, I seek refuge; do not let me ever be put to shame; in your righteousness deliver me.
- 2 Incline your ear to me; rescue me speedily. Be a rock of refuge for me, a strong fortress to save me.

A reading from the book of Ephesians (2.19-22)

So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God.

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John (20.24-29)

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

This is the gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, o Christ.

Reflection:

Reflection on St Thomas, from Bishop Mike's sermon on 27 June 2020, at the licensing of ordinands, who should have been ordained deacon that day.

Saturday 27th June should have been a joyful day spent at the Cathedral for those who had prepared for ordination. Instead we were meeting on ZOOM, everyone in their own home, kitchen or sitting room, wearing cassock and alb, with a witness present to sign the document saying that the ordinands had taken the vows of allegiance. Therefore, no surprise that Bishop Mike talked about 'disappointment' in his sermon, saying to the 'deacons to be': 'Today you are literally disappointed, disappointed, deprived of appointment as deacons' and then he says 'so make good use of this disappointment!' As we are disappointed today, not to be together to celebrate St Thomas Day in Church, followed by a BBQ, perhaps we too can find something in this experience that draws us closer to God.

Bishop Mike: 'Look at Thomas in our reading today. Thomas has suffered a three-fold disappointment, first in Jesus not being who he thought he was, second in Jesus death leaving him without direction and in mortal danger and now third in not sharing the disciples strange experience of seeing the risen Lord. Unsurprisingly then, his reaction to his friends' suggestion that Jesus is risen is not coolly sceptical, but intensely angry. Aggressively, he demands that he thrusts his hands in Jesus' wounds before he believes. The imagery, the action, the body language is incredibly violent. Thomas has been let down, hurt by the one he loved, wounded by those closest to him, just as we in our own histories have (inevitably) been let down, hurt by loved ones, wounded by the ones close to us. There is every possibility anger will take over – that we respond bitterly to such people (or their memory). "Why shouldn't !?", "Look what has been done to me", "it's so unfair" we cry and something of this we see in Thomas. But where does his resentment, his bitterness and his anger lead? It leads him to shutting out the Good News, he shuts out New Life, he shuts out the very thing that offers healing.

Thomas is us. Thomas is you and me. That's why he's called Thomas the twin, he's our twin.

But the good news is that the Risen Lord doesn't let him or us alone in that place of withdrawal, woundedness and woe. Jesus comes to Thomas and looks at him not with a reproachful and accusing stare, but with compassion and humility. (Can you imagine that, that in the middle of your most ridiculous strop, your most stupid of sulks, your angriest defiance, Jesus appears and looks at you with compassion and humility?). Jesus suggests that Thomas places his hands in his wounds – offering his body up to violence once again that Thomas might see, and it is in this moment that Thomas does see, sees both his own error and the truth of Jesus. And so, his grudge shifts to gratitude, his resentment shifts to recognition, his anger shifts to awe, as he exclaims "my Lord and my God".

If we learn anything from Thomas it might be that our disappointment is an opportunity and a danger, but the ball is in our court as to whether this will be resolved in ways which break us open to our Lord and one another OR close us down even to ourselves.

Amen.

Alleluia, alleluia!

But look! there breaks a yet more glorious day; saints all-triumphant rise in bright array the king of glory passes on his way!
