A reading from the letter to the Ephesians (1.15-end)

For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms, far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every name that is invoked, not only in the present age but also in the one to come. And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way. **This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.**

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew (25.31-end)

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit on his glorious throne. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

"Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' "Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you who are cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.'

"They also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?' He will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.' Then they will go away to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life. **This is the gospel of the Lord.** *Praise to you, o Christ.*

Reflection: 'The King will reply: Truly, I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' Matthew 25.40

It's the season for saints, and any of you who follow morning prayer from the Bishop's oratory will have noticed that we have had many inspiring saints during November, among them Queen Margaret of Scotland (1043-1093), Princess Elizabeth of Hungary (1207-1231) and our much loved King Edmund (~840-870), who we commemorate on 20th November. Today, as we are thinking about 'Christ the King' in the light of the above Bible readings, I find the example of these medieval 'royal' saints extremely helpful, as I struggle to hold together our contemporary image of kings and queens with that of Christ the King.

What do we know about King Edmund, apart from him being beheaded by the Danes, his head separated from his body and found by a wolf? Born in about the year 840, Edmund was nominated as king while still a boy. He became King of Norfolk in 855 and of Suffolk the following year. As king, he won the hearts of his subjects by his care of the poor and his steady suppression of wrong-doing. When attacked by the Danes, he refused to give over his kingdom or to renounce his faith in Christ. He followed closely in the example of Jesus, not taking up weapons when the Danes came to arrest, torture and kill him. The people of Bury, who added St Edmund to the name of their town and people across the world, have been inspired by his example ever since.

I wonder what happened over the centuries that it became harder and harder for Christian kings and queens to live a life of service inspired by their faith, with a concern for the poor and vulnerable at the centre? Thankfully, our society to this day has been shaped by the values of Christianity, which sees everyone as a child of God and encourages us to take care of each other, especially those who are in need, who are hungry, homeless, imprisoned, victims of injustice and exploitation. I am not keen on using military language in relation to the Christian life, but it is a great image to think of the army of Christians, following a king who inspires us to follow him in the service of others; in caring for the least of our brothers and sisters as the gospel reminds us today. The COVID pandemic is generating armies of volunteers, many Christian, many from other religions, many of no faith, living out the gospel calling to feed the hungry, the thirsty, to welcome the stranger, visit the sick and those in prison. However, seeing the need of our time, in our own country and across the world, it's easy to become overwhelmed, thinking 'what difference can I actually make?' Especially, when we feel tired, anxious and overwhelmed ourselves. That's where prayer comes in, everyday! To hear Jesus' invitation to come to him, when we feel weary, full of doubts and overwhelmed. To pause, to be nurtured by his word and presence; to remember that we have friends, family who care about us, who are Christ to us; to notice the varied ways Christ comes to us. Sometimes, it is us, who are the 'poor and needy' – remember - 'blessed are those who are poor, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven (Mt 5.3). At all times, whether we are weary or full of energy, staying close to Jesus reminds us that every single act of love and kindness makes a difference. Last Sunday's gospel, in the parable of the talents, Jesus encouraged us to use everything we have and are, in the service of his kingdom.

So, as we celebrate the feast of Christ the king today, we may want to ask ourselves which kingdom we choose to live in: one in which the king, like King Edmund, leads by example, having such love for Jesus and faith, that he dedicated his live to building a kingdom on earth in which people care for each other, irrespective of background and status, willing to make sacrifices for their faith. Or would we rather live in a kingdom where everyone pursues their own wealth and status?

In our first reading today, St. Paul encourages the Ephesians: 'I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms.

Our king, Christ, chose to be with the poor and to give his life to save the world. He lives in us, invites us to trust his presence and follow his example of self-giving love. Amen.
